- Short term Certificate (<1 year @ 2 year IHE)




What Happens After High School?




School and Work Status, First Year After High School Central Texas, 9th Grade Cohort, 2006-2007






Income Composition, First Year After High School Central Texas, 9th Grade Cohort, 2006-2007





Racial/Ethnic Composition, First Year After High School Central Texas, 9th Grade Cohort, 2006-2007








School and Work Status, 6th Year After High School Central Texas, 9th Grade Cohort, 2006-2007






Employment Status and Earnings, 6th Year After High School Central Texas, 9th Grade Cohort, 2006-2007



Graduates	50%	70%	10%
Non- Graduates	50%	40%	3%

- 36% of White Students
- 65% of Hispanic Students
- 54% of Black Students
- 37% of Asian Students
- 67% of Low Income Students






Gaps in Central Texas High School Graduation Rates Declined Significantly Over Past Decade






Higher Education Enrollment Decreased Since 2007 For All Groups
